Seven people have been rushed to hospital after a **Tesla** was wrecked as it ploughed into a lamppost on a busy **London** street.

Footage shows the aftermath of the crash as the mangled white car sits ruined outside a **Sainsbury's** Local store and pedestrians lie sprawled on the pavement. Bits of black debris are also scattered at the junction of Mile End Road and Harford Street in Stepney Green, east London where the collision took place on Sunday afternoon.

Three ambulances, a trauma team and fire engine are understood to have been sent out with two of the injured needing to be urgently taken to a major trauma centre.

A London Ambulance Service spokesman said: 'We were called at 5.26pm on Sunday to reports of a road traffic collision in Mile End Road, E1.

'We sent a number of resources to the scene including three ambulance crews.

'We also dispatched a trauma team in a car from London's Air Ambulance.

'The first paramedic arrived in less than seven minutes.

'We treated seven patients at the scene and took them all to hospital.

'Two of these patients were taken to a major trauma centre as a priority.'

A London Fire Brigade spokesman added: 'Firefighters were called to a road traffic collision on Sunday.

'One car was in collision with a lamppost and a traffic light.

'One fire engine was in attendance from Shoreditch fire station.

'The Brigade's 999 Control officers received their first call alerting them to the incident at 7.56pm and the incident was over for the brigade by 8.21pm.'

The Met Police said: 'We attended a road traffic collision involving a car and multiple pedestrians in Mile End Road, E3 at 17:26hrs on Sunday, 16 March.

'Seven people – the driver of the car and six pedestrians – were treated at the scene and were later taken to hospital by the London Ambulance Service, where their injuries were deemed non-life-changing or life-threatening.
